Interesting facts

Impacts:

Grows in dense thickets displacing other plants. Possible negative impact on pollinators as it is not a good food source for caterpillars. Causes infrastructure damage, especially on the transport network and old buildings.





Habitat:

Tolerates a wide variety of habitats but prefers dry, disturbed ground. Widespread in gardens, waste ground, along railways and canals, pavements, walls and derelict buildings.

A fast growing, large deciduous or semi-evergreen shrub.


It was introduced to Britain in 1896 and known to be widely distributed in the wild by 1922.

Butterfly bush is a well-known garden escaper.

How it spreads:

Seeds are dispersed by wind.
