Potential impacts:

Lady's mantle forms dense clumps and can outcompete other and plants and it is already being managed on our nature reserves.

Habitat:

Tolerates a wide variety of habitats. Grows on roadsides, hedge banks, riverbanks, disused railway lines and gravel pits, dry grassland, and waste ground.

A deep-rooted herbaceous perennial.

Introduced to Britain by 1874 and first recorded in the wild in 1925. Lady's mantle is a well-known garden escaper.

How it spreads:


Spreads mainly by seed. It can also spread by rhizome fragments.


