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Red valerian roots burrow into cracks and mortar joints and can loosen brick and stone work in walls and buildings. Red valerian can outcompete other plants, especially on coastal cliffs.




Prefers disturbed, open and well-drained habitats. Walls, old buildings, pavements and roadside, coastal cliffs and shingle.



A semi-evergreen herbaceous perennial with woody stems in more mature plants. Red valerian is a well known garden escaper that is widely distributed. It was introduced to Britain by 1596 and was first recorded in the wild in 1698.

How it spreads:

Seeds are dispersed by wind.
